Thoroughly examine your pet for foxtails, which can cause pain, swelling, and potentially death if untreated. Don't forget eyes, ears, mouth, and especially between toes. If you're unable to remove a foxtail, call your veterinarian right away.



Be sure your trash is secure and pets cannot get to bones, fat drippings, corn cobs, or alcoholic drinks.

Check that your screens are securely in place before leaving any doors or windows open.

### KEEP YOUR PET SAFE FROM HEATSTROKE

To keep your pet cool and hydrated, provide plenty of water and shade or keep them in a cool, air-conditioned room. Watch for signs of heatstroke and take the following actions.

#### Signs:

- Panting or salivating excessively
- Weakness
- Staggering or walking unsteadily
- Vomiting
- Deep red or purple tongue
- Warm, dry skin
- Glazed eyes
- Rapid pulse

#### What to do:

- Immediately call your veterinarian.
- Move your pet to a cooler area.
- Avoid sudden cooling (e.g., ice bath).
- Apply isopropyl alcohol 70% to their foot pads.
- Place a cool damp towel on their back.
- Allow them to drink only small amounts of water.

### NEVER LEAVE YOUR PET UNATTENDED IN THE CAR

Pets should never be left in a car alone—even with a window cracked.

If you see another pet in danger, take the following steps:

- Alert business management.
- Call police or animal control.
- Record vehicle make, model, color, license plate.
- Stay with the pet until help arrives. You can save a life!
